Frederick R. Stolper has served in both domestic and overseas assignments that have involved criminal investigations, dignitary protection, organizational management, and overseas security program management since beginning his career in security and law enforcement with the Bureau of Diplomatic Security (DS) at the U.S. Department of State in 1997. In the U.S., DS protects diplomats (Secretary of State, ambassadors, etc.), investigates passport and visa fraud and theft, and manages issues of immunity for foreign diplomats. The bureau also manages the Rewards for Justice program and co-chairs the Overseas Security Advisory Council (OSAC), a joint venture of the U.S. Department of State and the private sector to promote security cooperation between American business and private sector interests worldwide. Stolper's domestic assignments include service in the Secretary of State's protective detail, and the Washington Field Office. His overseas assignments include service as the Assistant Regional Security Officer in Berlin, Germany, and the Regional Security Officer Baku, Azerbaijan. He received a BS in criminal justice from Southern Illinois University (1983).
