Spontaneous, free, natural speech

Rehearsed

Speech that is prepared, practiced, or memorized in advance

Imitative

Speaking (repeating) after a model—whether live or recorded



TIPS for Successful Public Speaking

Feeling some nervousness before giving a speech is natural and even beneficial. But too much nervousness can be detrimental. Here are some proven tips on how to control your butterflies and give better presentations:

- Know your material. Pick a topic you are interested in. Know more about it than you include in your speech. Use personal stories and conversational language that way you won't easily forget what to say.
- Practice. Practice. Practice! Rehearse out loud with all equipment you plan on using. Revise as necessary.
- Know the audience. Greet some of the audience members as they arrive. It's easier to speak to a group of friends than to strangers.
- Know the room. Arrive early, walk around the speaking area and practice using the microphone and any visual aids.
- Relax. Ease tension by doing exercises. Transform nervous energy into enthusiasm.
- Visualize yourself giving your speech. Imagine yourself speaking, your voice loud, clear and confident. Visualize the audience clapping it will boost your confidence.
- Realize that people want you to succeed. Audiences want you to be interesting, stimulating, informative and entertaining. They don't want you to fail.
- Don't apologize for any nervousness or problem the audience probably never noticed it.
- Concentrate on the message not the medium. Focus your attention away from your own anxieties and concentrate on your message and your audience.
- Gain experience. Experience builds confidence, which is the key to effective speaking. A Toastmasters club can provide the experience you need in a safe and friendly environment.


