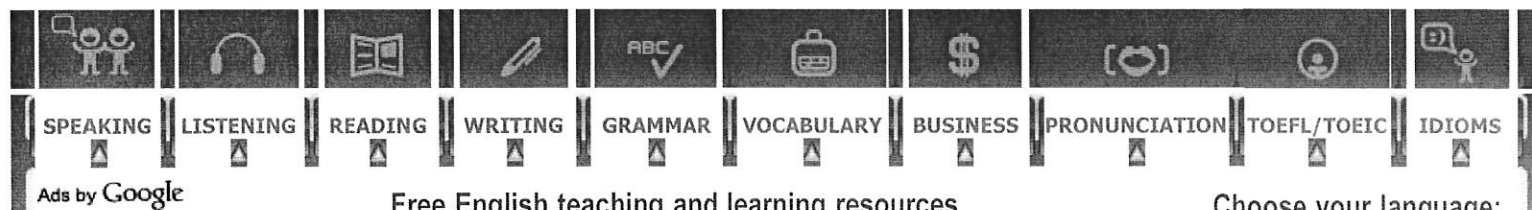

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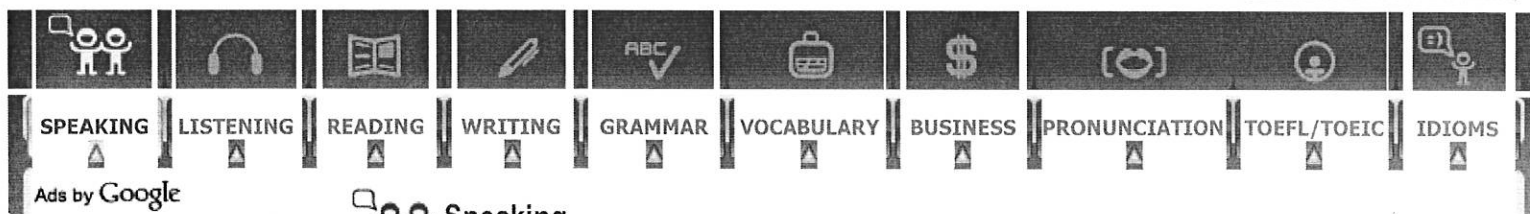

Basic Principles and Procedures

“Don’t throw out the baby with the bath water.”

1. Identify key teaching points, objectives (in order to protect and preserve them when making changes)
2. Identify problems (e.g., incorrect, unrealistic situation, behavior, language, teaching approach)
3. Take corrective action (e.g., proofread and correct language; modify situation, characters, language; extend or telescope practice exercises; expand; supplement; simplify; modernize; localize)
4. Implement without being overly critical or negative (be diplomatic in order to maintain harmony within the teaching situation)

Thorough, Direct Vocabulary Teaching

(Adapted from Bernard D. Seal, "Vocabulary Learning and Teaching" in *Teaching English as a Second or Foreign Language*, Marianne Celce-Murcia, ed.)

Recommendation: Select words to be taught together from the same "lexical domain" (i.e., situational, topical area, such as "family" or "shopping")

Stage 1: Convey Meaning

Present each new word to learners so that they can grasp its meaning by using...

Visual aids (pictures, drawings, mime, etc.)

Word relations (synonyms, antonyms, classification, etc.)

Pictorial schemata (Venn diagrams, grids, tree diagrams, etc.)

Definition, explanation, examples, anecdotes

Context (embedding the word in a sentence that reveals its meaning)

Word roots and affixes (esp. for Greek and Latin-based terms)

Stage 2: Check Understanding

Make certain that learners have truly understood the correct meaning through exercises such as...

Fill in the blanks in a passage with the appropriate words

Matching pairs (synonyms, antonyms, definitions, pictures)

Sorting (into categories, such as "mammals," "reptiles," "birds")

Pictorial Schemata (e.g., check off characteristics of items on grids)

Stage 3: Consolidate

Help learners relate the new word to their personal experience and use it in a context that is meaningful to them through activities such as...

Problem-solving tasks that require the learner to use the new word repeatedly when solving the problem (e.g., designing a weekend television schedule for a TV station)

Values clarification (e.g., "qualities of an ideal spouse")

Write a story or dialog using all (or most) of the new words

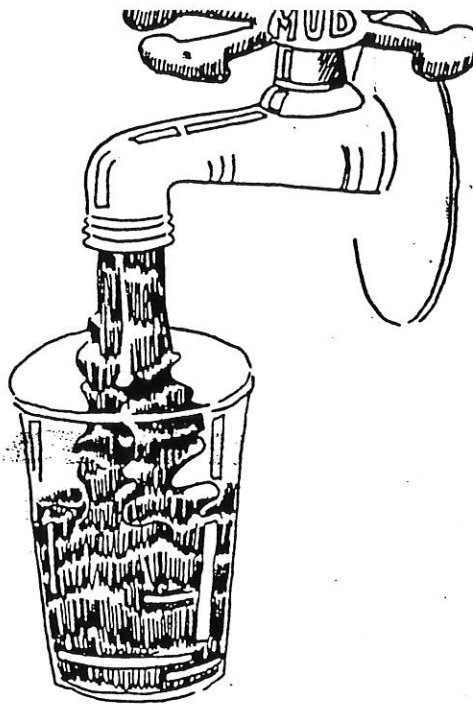

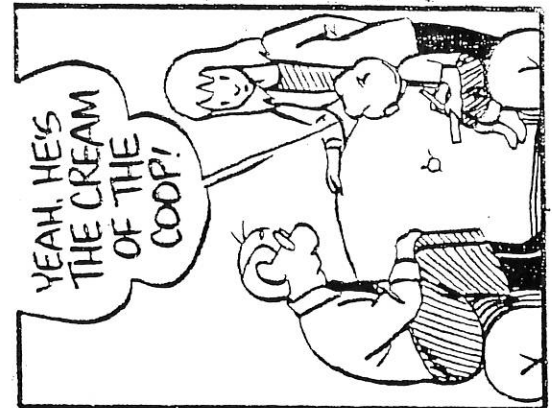

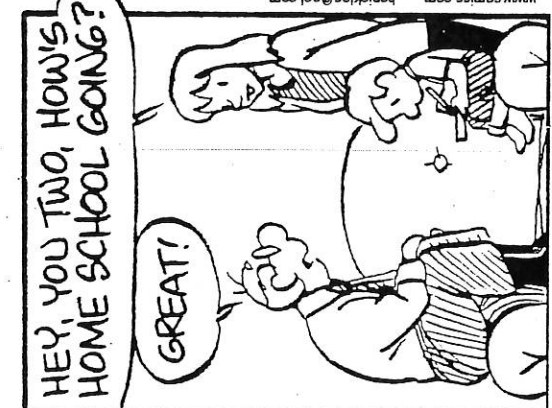
