

PLAGUE, PENICILLIN, & PASTEUR:

MICROBIOLOGY IN EUROPE

ENGLAND, NETHERLANDS, FRANCE

STUDY ABROAD SUMMER 2023



This program will focus on the historical and applied aspects of microbiology and molecular biology. Students will visit London, Cambridge, Oxford, Amsterdam, Delft, and Paris as part of the study abroad. Visits to museums will be highlighted with presentations that the general public do not get to see, including disease diagnosis using London plague pit skeletons, Fleming's lab where penicillin was discovered, microscopes made by van Leeuwenhoek and Darwin, and the Cavendish Laboratory! We will make bread at *Le Cordon Bleu* in Paris and gouda cheese in Gouda (and eat them, too!). The program will end in Paris. This program will be most appealing to science students, but especially those interested in medicine, microbiology, and food science, as they will learn how these disciplines are applied and used in daily living.

DATES

The program is a summer term program and the dates are expected to be 27 June–28 July 2023 (official dates TBA).

HOUSING

Students will stay in hostels and hotels arranged by the program.

COURSES OFFERED

Students are required to enroll in 6 credit hours during the program and may choose from the following:

- Students majoring in Microbiology/Molecular Biology:
 - MMBIO 471—Applied and Industrial Microbiology (2 credits)
 - MMBIO 510—History and Philosophy of Microbiology (2 credits)
 - MMBIO 390R—Readings in Molecular Biology (1 credit)
 - MMBIO 490R—Microbiology/Molecular Biology Seminar (1 credit)
- Students majoring in other programs
 - MMBIO 221—General Microbiology (3 credits)
 - MMBIO 510—History and Philosophy of Microbiology (2 credits)

- MMBIO 490R—Microbiology/Molecular Biology Seminar (1 credit)

Students may not take any other courses during this program, including BYU Online courses, without approval by the program director and ISP.

COST

\$5,500–6,000

Includes Latter-day Saint undergraduate full tuition (increased cost for graduate and non-Latter-day Saint students), housing, in-country travel, entrance fees, and international health insurance coverage.

Does not include airfare, preparation course tuition, most meals, or personal expenses.

TRAVEL

Students are responsible for purchasing their own airfare to and from the program sites. Airfare reservations must be made through BYU Travel. Students should contact a BYU Travel agent.

PREPARATION

No prerequisites required. This study abroad is for students in any major.

Accepted students are required to participate in an international, cross-cultural preparation course (IAS 201R, 1 credit hour).

This evening course will be held during the second block of winter semester. (Part-time and non-BYU students will need to pay an additional \$300 tuition fee for enrolling in the prep class.) Accompanying spouses need to be credit-bearing participants on the program; they will need to apply online and take the preparation course.

Students must meet all country- and program-specific COVID and health requirements for travel.

FUNDING SOURCES

Regular BYU tuition scholarships, Pell Grants, and Federal Insured Student Loans may be applied to study abroad programs.

Students who submit the financial aid section of the ISP application and who have a current FAFSA form on file at the Financial Aid Office (A-41 ASB) will be considered for a study abroad scholarship.

Academic departments and colleges may assist with scholarships and grants.

Private grants and scholarships outside of BYU may also assist (see <http://kennedy.byu.edu/scholarships>).

APPLICATION PROCESS

Students must be adults 18 years of age or older to participate.

Complete the online application at kennedy.byu.edu/isp-apply. A nonrefundable \$35 is required; applicants will be interviewed once the application is complete. Students will be notified via email of their acceptance into the program. The first payment is due upon acceptance.
