

PARIS

STUDY ABROAD FALL 2023



Have you been dreaming of traveling to Paris, learning French (or improving your French) while in the City of Light? Then this is your program! You will take courses on location (from language classes to art history to French cinema) and you will be immersed in the French language and culture. Paris will be your classroom as you learn about different periods of art, architecture, and history, or practice your conversation skills. Study the art of Monet, Renoir, Degas, Delacroix, and other French masters in the Louvre, Musée D'Orsay, and other museums. Visit the Opera Garnier, the Eiffel Tower, and stroll along the Champs Elysées. Eat lunch at your favorite café, try a dessert from Stohrer, the oldest Parisian pastry shop that used to provide pastries for Marie Antoinette, taste chocolate at the Salon du Chocolat, and admire the city lights from a boat on the Seine river.

A variety of courses will allow you to learn about French language and civilization, while fulfilling BYU GE requirements and/or earning credit toward majors or minors in French, humanities, and/or international cinema studies. In addition, you will have the opportunity to learn about the history of the LDS Church in France. No prior French language instruction is required. Besides short trips, the program will include excursions focusing on the “sacred paths” of the humanity, from prehistoric painted caves to stunning pilgrimage roads and sites in South-West France, to churches in Belgium, and Italy. Come see Paris at its best, in the changing colors of fall when all the summer tourists have left, and enjoy an unforgettable cultural and educational experience. French language, culture and civilization courses will be taught by the program director at the LDS Institute building in the Marais district of Paris and at the language school l'Etoile by native French faculty.

DATES

HOUSING

Students will share a French host family with another BYU student. Host family stays include breakfasts and three dinners a week. The host-family experience is an amazing opportunity to learn about French everyday life, and a way to practice and improve language skills and deepen cultural understanding.

COURSES

Students must take at least twelve credit hours from the following courses:

FNART 270R—European Fine Arts (3 credit hours- fulfills GE requirements for arts)
REL 350R—LDS Church in a World Setting (2 credit hours-counts as a religion elective)
*FREN 317—French Cinema (fulfills GE requirements for arts)
*FREN 362—French Civilization (3 credit hours, GE requirement for arts)
*Courses may be counted for French Studies major, secondary major, or minor credit.

COST

\$8,700–\$9,000

Included: Latter-day Saint, undergraduate full tuition (increased cost for graduate and non-Latter-day Saint students), housing, some meals with the host family, public transportation in Paris, group transportation on field trips, and international health insurance.

Not included: airfare (\$1,500–2,000), some meals in Paris, personal expenses, or passport.

TRAVEL

Students are responsible for purchasing their own airfare to and from the program sites. Airfare reservations must be made through BYU Travel. Students should contact a BYU Travel agent at 280 HRCB (801-422-6293) or travel@byu.edu.

PREPARATION

Students are required to complete the study abroad preparation course (IAS 201R, 1 credit hour) offered once a week as an evening class during the second-block of winter semester. Accompanying spouses need to be credit-bearing participants on the program. Spouses will also need to apply online and take the preparation course.

All participants are required to show proof of complete COVID-19 vaccination (including booster) at least two weeks prior to departure.

FUNDING SOURCES

Regular BYU tuition scholarships, Pell Grants, and Federal Insured Student Loans may be applied to study abroad programs. Students who submit the financial aid section of the ISP application and who have a current FAFSA form on file will be considered for a study abroad scholarship and must indicate on their online application that they want to be considered for financial aid. Academic departments and colleges may assist with scholarships and grants. Private grants and scholarships outside of BYU may also assist (see kennedy.byu.edu/scholarships). The BYU College of Humanities provides scholarships for interns for French studies majors and secondary majors. Your first or second major is in the College of Humanities? You may qualify for a program discount ranging from \$500 to \$3000 based on financial need.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Students must be 18 years of age or older. Complete the online application at kennedy.byu.edu/apply. There is a \$35 application fee. Applicants will be interviewed once the application is complete. Students will be notified via e-mail of their acceptance into the program. The first payment is due upon acceptance.
