

SCANDINAVIA

DENMARK, FINLAND, ICELAND, NORWAY, AND SWEDEN INTERNSHIPS 2024



BYU's Scandinavia Internship Program offers invaluable professional and cultural development experiences. This program caters both to speakers of a target language in Scandinavia and to those wanting to do an English-speaking internship. Internships reflect a combination of student interests and provider availability, e.g., research, biotechnology, government, museums, public relations, communications, business, marketing, IT, education, etc., and, as such, all majors are welcome to apply.

DATES

Winter 2024: 13–14 January to 6–10 April

Spr/Sum 2024: 11–12 May to 3–7 August

Fall 2024: 14–15 September to 7–11 December

Students may remain in the Schengen Treaty Zone (most of Western Europe) for up to ninety days without a visa.

HOUSING

Students are responsible for finding their own housing and providing their own meals.

COURSES

Students are required to enroll in a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester (this means 6 credit hours per term of spring/summer combined). Interns may choose from the following courses:

IAS 380R— Cultural Proofs (3 credit hours)

SCAND 399R—Academic Internship (3 credit hours)

IAS 399R— International Internship (9 variable credit hours)

Cultures and Languages Across the Curriculum (CLAC) course also available (1 credit hour)

Participants may not take any other courses on this program, including BYU Online courses, without approval by the program director and ISP.

COST

Students pay for Latter-day Saint undergraduate full tuition for 12 credits (increased cost for graduate and non-Latter-day Saint students), which covers the cost of international health insurance coverage and internship placement.

Does not include international airfare, accommodations (single room from 500-1,400 euro/mo. depending on location), passport, visa(s), immunizations, personal expenses, local transportation, meals, or cell phones/international data plan. Cost for accompanying spouse is BYU Latter-day Saint undergraduate tuition for 3 credit hours, internship placement and international health care coverage. Does not include for spouse housing, airfare, personal expenses, and meals.

TRAVEL

Students are responsible for purchasing their own airfare to and from the program. Airfare reservations must be made through BYU Travel. Students should contact a BYU Travel agent at:

PREPARATION

Students do not need prior experience in one of the Scandinavian languages to participate in this internship.

Students are required to participate in the prep course, IAS 369R, during the second block of winter semester. Part-time BYU students and non-BYU students pay an additional \$300 (approximately) tuition fee for enrolling in the required pre-departure class.

Passports must be valid for at least six months beyond the end of the program and have at least two blank pages. Passports must be valid for at least six months beyond the end of the program and have at least two blank pages. All US citizens must obtain a quick online document known as ETIAS (European Travel Information and Authorization System) <https://www.schengenvisainfo.com/etias/> before entering any of the EU/Schengen member countries.

Accompanying spouses need to be credit-bearing participants on the program. Spouses also will need to apply online and take the preparation course.

Students must meet all country- and program- specific COVID and health requirements for travel.

FUNDING SOURCES

Regular BYU tuition scholarships and Federal Insured Student Loans may be applied to international programs. Pell Grants may be applied to fall, winter, and Spr-Sum semesters. Students who submit the financial aid section of the ISP application, and who have a current FAFSA form on file at the Financial Aid Office (A-41 ASB), will be considered for a Study Abroad scholarship. Academic departments and colleges may assist with scholarships and grants. Private grants and scholarships outside of BYU may also assist (see kennedy.byu.edu/scholarships). Students majoring in the Humanities who complete the preparation course and register for 3 hours of HCOLL 399R or departmental equivalent qualify for a College of Humanities program discount that ranges from \$1500–3000, depending on one's FAFSA score. Students minoring in the Humanities who fulfill the aforementioned requirements receive half support. Contact Dr. Brown for details.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Students must be adults 18 years-of-age or older. Complete the online application at kennedy.byu.edu/isp-apply. The application requires a \$35 fee. Students will be notified via e-mail of their acceptance into the program. Applicants will be interviewed once the application is complete. The first payment is due upon acceptance.
