## Kent F. Schull

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF OTTOMAN AND MODERN MIDDLE EAST  
HISTORY, SUNY BINGHAMTON

Kent F. Schull is an associate professor of Ottoman and modern Middle East history at SUNY Binghamton. He is a twice Fulbright Scholar to Turkey. Schull's research interests include crime, punishment, and criminal justice in the late Ottoman Empire, the history of World War I in the Middle East, socio-legal history, Islamic criminal law, and Muslims in North America and Europe. His first book, *Prisons in the Late Ottoman Empire: Microcosms of Modernity* (2014),

investigates the transformation of the Ottoman criminal justice system, particularly prisons, during the nineteenth century by juxtaposing reform policies with implementation and the experiences of inmates and prison officials. His forthcoming book, *Living in the Ottoman Realm: Sultans, Subjects, and Elites* (co-edited with Christine Isom-Verhaaren) is due out in 2015. Schull received an MST from the University of Oxford and an MA and a PhD from UCLA.
