

GLOBAL PHILANTHROPY AND BEYOND: REINVENTING FOREIGN ASSISTANCE



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Carol Adelman is a Senior Fellow and director of the Center for Global Prosperity (CGP) at the Hudson Institute where she lectures, writes, and advises media on economic growth, foreign aid, global philanthropy, and international healthcare issues. Adelman developed and oversees CGP's main publication, the annual *Index of Global Philanthropy and Remittances*. CGP's work is widely used by the U.S. government, multilateral agencies, philanthropic institutions, media, and academia. Previously, she headed international services for two consulting companies, one private and one publicly held. As a presidential appointee, she served as assistant administrator at USAID, in charge of all foreign aid programs to Asia, the Middle East, and Central and Eastern Europe when the Berlin Wall fell. In her early career as a Foreign Service officer with USAID, Adelman lived and worked in Africa, Latin America, and Asia. She has served as

vice chair of the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid for USAID and vice chair of the Helping to Enhance the Livelihood of People (HELP) Commission, a bipartisan congressional commission established to provide high-level oversight and evaluation of the U.S. foreign aid program. She is a past vice chair and current board member of the Atlantic Council and member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Adelman is a recipient of the Heloise Waislitz Visiting Fellowship in Philanthropy at the Asia Pacific Centre for Social Investment and Philanthropy, Swinburne University, Melbourne, Australia. She is also past president and current board member of Capital Partners for Education, a charity that provides scholarships and mentors for low-income students in the D.C. metropolitan area. Adelman received an MPH and a PhD from John Hopkins University and an MS in foreign service from Georgetown University.
