WHAT AFRICAN HISTORY TEACHES US
Leslie Hadfield

Leslie Hadfield has been teaching African history at Brigham Young University since 2010. Hadfield's research interests include South African liberation movements and black South African nurses. She has conducted extensive oral history interviews, which are an important part of her work in

social history. Hadfield has lived in South Africa and speaks Xhosa; she has also studied Swahili in Tanzania and has a broad range of interests in African history throughout the continent. She received a PhD in African history from Michigan State University.
