Antonio de Lecea was appointed the principal advisor for economic and financial affairs at the EU Delegation to the United States in 2009. Prior to joining the delegation, de Lecea served as director for international affairs in the European Commission's Directorate General for Economic and Financial Affairs, steering analytical and policy support for the commission's economic relations with non-EU countries and multilateral and regional economic institutions, including the IMF, the World Bank, the G-20, the G7/G8, and the OECD. From 1999 to 2004, he was the economic advisor to then-European Commission President Romano Prodi. De Lecea launched his career at the European Commission

in 1986, holding management positions in the EU budget and control areas, as well as in economics and finance. Before joining the European Commission, he served in the private office of the Spanish Secretary of State for Finance in Madrid and in academia. His published articles are on public finance and the European economy. He is an associate professor of applied economics in the Basque Country University (UPV), in Bilbao, Spain, a position he now holds on special leave. De Lecea received a BS in economics from the Barcelona Autonomous University (UAB) and a PhD in quantitative economics from the Catholic University of Louvain (UCL).
