## Patricia Dorff

EDITORIAL DIRECTOR, PUBLISHING, CFR

Patricia Dorff is the editorial director at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR), an independent, nonpartisan membership organization, think tank, and publisher dedicated to being a resource to better understand the world and the foreign policy choices facing the U.S. and other countries. Dorff has nearly three decades of publishing experience with a diverse background in international relations, editing, production, and marketing. As editorial director, she oversees all CFR publications and directs the council's international partnerships program with foreign publishers to translate and post content online. In addition, she advises CFR senior fellows on their writing and assists with the promotion and distribution of publications. Dorff also works with various publishers—such as Random House, Knopf, Princeton University Press, and Oxford University Press—on CFR books, and she regularly teaches editing classes for CFR senior fellows and research

associates. She was editor of *Foreign Affairs Chronology* (1991–95) and associate editor of *Foreign Affairs* magazine (1988–95), which was recently ranked as one of the most influential journals among print and broadcast media in a survey of U.S. opinion leaders. While working at *Foreign Affairs*, she was responsible for editing articles on the Middle East, Asia, and Africa. With Ambassador Princeton N. Lyman, she is coeditor of the book *Africa: Beyond Humanitarianism: What You Need to Know About Africa and Why It Matters*, which was published in 2007. Dorff graduated with combined honor degrees in history and political science from the University of California—Los Angeles, received an MA in international relations from Georgetown University, and an MA in philosophy in international relations from Columbia University. Dorff lives in New York City with her husband and two children.
