Stan Taylor

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Stan Taylor is an emeritus professor of political science at BYU and former chair of that department, as well as the founding director of the Kennedy Center. During one of Taylor's several leaves, he was a member of the first staff of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, where he was one of two senior staffers who developed the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) in 1978. Taylor retired from teaching at BYU in 2006 but continued on as senior fellow at the Kennedy Center. He has been a visiting professor at the University of Kent in Canterbury, the University of Wales in Swansea, and at the University of Otago in New Zealand, where he has taught a course on U.S. intelligence and national security and was a Fulbright senior lecturer in 1993.

(He is on the Fulbright Senior Scholar Registry) Before coming to BYU, he taught international relations at Tufts and was the chairman of the Government Department at Bentley College in Boston for four years. Taylor is on the board of editors of the academic journal *Intelligence and National Security* and publishes frequently in intelligence journals. He wrote the chapter on "Treason" for the *Oxford Handbook of National Security Intelligence* (2009) and has a chapter in every intelligence handbook published in the last ten years. Taylor received a PhD from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy in 1968. Most important to Stan, he is the father, grandfather, or great-grandfather of thirty-five really great people.
