Kristen Renwick Monroe is a professor of political science and philosophy at the University of California—Irvine whose work has changed the field of political psychology, political economy, and normative political theory. Monroe's award-winning work on altruism and moral choice deals with a central problem in politics and ethics: our treatment of others. Her publications include fourteen single-authored books or edited volumes and over fifty articles or book chapters. She has received a Pulitzer nomination, a National Book Award nomination, two American Political Science Association Best Book awards (the Robert Lane Award) and two of

the APSA's lifetime achievement awards (the 2010 Goodnow Award and APSA's 2010 Ithiel de Sola Pool Award), and the 2010 Paul Silverman Award for Outstanding Work in Ethics. Monroe has served as president of the International Society of Political Psychology and vice president of the American Political Science Association. She is currently working on several books on topics relating to ethics. These include books on gender equality in academia, Jewish émigrés from the Third Reich, a book on identity and ethics, and a book of stories demonstrating the process by which ordinary people make moral choices.
