## Mitchell Lerner

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Mitchell Lerner is an associate professor of history at The Ohio State University and the Mershon Center for International Security Studies. Lerner's research and teaching focus is on modern American diplomatic and political history, with an emphasis on U.S.–Korean relations. He is currently at work on a policy history of the Johnson Administration, as well as a broad study of U.S.–Korean relations during the Cold War. His first book, the *Pueblo Incident: A Spy Ship and the Failure of American Foreign Policy* (2002) won the 2002 John Lyman Book Award for the best work of U.S. Naval History and was named by the American Library Association as one of fifty “historically significant works” that would not have been published after the passage of Executive Order 13233. It was also nominated for the Pulitzer and Bancroft Prizes. He is the editor of *Looking Back at LBJ* (2005), a collection of essays about the Johnson Administration, and has published articles about modern American politics and foreign policy in numerous anthologies and

journals, including *Diplomatic History*, *Diplomacy and Statecraft*, *Presidential Studies Quarterly*, *Southwestern Historical Quarterly*, the *Korea Society Quarterly*, and the *Journal of Cold War Studies*. Lerner was elected to the governing council of the Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations in 2008 and is on the advisory board of the North Korea International Documentation Project. He also serves as editor of *Passport: The Newsletter of the Society of Historians of American Foreign Relations*, and serves on the teaching committee of the Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations. From 2001 to 2003, he was a fellow at the University of Virginia's Miller Center for Public Affairs, and in 2005–06, he held the Mary Ball Washington Distinguished Fulbright Chair in American History at University College—Dublin. Lerner received a BA from Brandeis University and a PhD from the University of Texas—Austin.
