Herman Teule is chair of Eastern Christianity and head of the Institute of Eastern Christian Studies at the Radboud University in Nijmegen, the oldest city in the Netherlands, and professor of Eastern Christianity at the Catholic University of Louvain. Teule is a specialist in Middle Eastern Christianity, working in particular on the Christian and Islamic literary culture of the eleventh to thirteenth centuries (often called the Syriac Renaissance), epitomized by the towering figure of Barhebraeus (d. 1286). He also works extensively on contemporary Christianity in Iraq and elsewhere in the

Middle East and has made frequent trips to the region, consulting with the European governmental and nongovernmental institutions on asylum procedures for Middle Eastern Christians and working with several Middle Eastern Christian groups in Europe. His recent publications include *Assyro-Chaldeans: Christians of Iraq, Iran and of Turkey* (Brepols, 2008, in French), and the *Syriac Renaissance* (Peeters, 2010). Teule also serves as a member of the advisory board for BYU's Eastern Christian Texts series.
