Dallas G. Denery, an associate professor of history at Bowdoin College, specializes in Medieval and Early Modern intellectual and religious history. Denery's publications include "Christine de Pizan on Misogyny, Gossip and Possibility" in the *Middle Ages in Texts and Texture* (University of Toronto Press, forthcoming), *Seeing and Being Seen in the Late Medieval World: Optics, Theology and Religious Life* (Cambridge University Press, 2005; paperback 2009), and "Protagoras and the Fourteenth-Century Invention of Epistemological Relativism"

in *Visualizing the Invisible: Visionary Techniques in Religious and Cultural Contexts* (*Visual Resources* XXV, nos. 1–2, March/June 2009: 29–51), and he is now completing a book on the history of lying entitled *Liars: Deception, Dishonesty, and the Origins of Modernity*. He is on the editorial board for *Disputatio* (Brepols Publishers, Turnhout, Belgium). Denery received a BA in philosophy from UC—Berkeley, an MA in philosophy from the Dominican School of Philosophy and Theology, and a PhD in history from UC—Berkeley.
