Aurelian Craiutu

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF POLITICAL SCIENCE, INDIANA UNIVERSITY—BLOOMINGTON

Aurelian Craiutu is an associate professor of political science at Indiana University—Bloomington, where he is also affiliated with the Russian and East European Institute, The WEST European Studies Institute, the Workshop in Political Theory and Policy Analysis, and the American Studies Program. Craiutu's research interests include French political and social thought (Montesquieu, Tocqueville, Constant, Madame de Staël, Guizot, Aron), varieties of liberalism and conservatism, democratic theory, as well as theories of transition to democracy and democratic consolidation in Eastern Europe. His latest book, *A Virtue for Courageous Minds: Moderation in French Political Thought, 1748–1830*, will be available in March. He has been the recipient of awards, fellowships, and grants from many institutions, including the Institute for Advanced Study

in Princeton, the American Council of Learned Societies, and the Earhart Foundation. In 2004, he received a Student Choice Award and an Outstanding Junior Faculty Award at Indiana University, and in 2000, he won the American Political Science Association's Leo Strauss Award for the best doctoral dissertation in the field of political theory. During the academic year 2008–09, Craiutu was a Member of the School of Social Science at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton. He received a BA with Honors in economics from the Academy of Economic Studies in Bucharest (1988), a Maîtrise level at the University of Rennes I in France (1990–91), an MA (1996) and a PhD in politics from Princeton University (1999), and he was a visiting Fulbright scholar at the University of Tennessee—Knoxville (1993–94).
