PROFESSOR OF INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL ECONOMY, BROWN UNIVERSITY

Mark Blyth is a professor of international political economy and faculty fellow of the Watson Institute for International Studies at Brown University. Blyth taught at Johns Hopkins University from 1997 to 2009. His research investigates how uncertainty and randomness impact complex systems, particularly economic systems. His latest book *Austerity: The History of a Dangerous Idea*

(2012) interrogates the return to prominence of financial orthodoxy following the global financial crisis. A native of Dundee, Scotland, he received a BA in political science (1990) and Russian language training (1991) from Strathclyde University and a PhD in political science from Columbia University (1999).
