

THE IDEA OF AMERICA IN EUROPEAN POLITICAL THOUGHT: 1492–9/11



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Alan M. Levine is an associate professor of political theory and director of the Political Theory Institute at American University. Levine is also an affiliate associate professor in AU's Department of Philosophy. A specialist in the history of Western political thought, his teaching and research interests include the theoretical principles of the U.S., the concept of "America," and ancient, renaissance, modern, and postmodern political theory. He has published on Montaigne, Machiavelli, Nietzsche, Chinua Achebe, Judith Shklar, European

views of America, and the origins of toleration. He has held fellowships at Princeton's James Madison Program, the Hoover Institution at Stanford, and the Institute of U.S. at the University of London. And he has had fellowships from the NEH, the Foundation for the Defense of Democracy to study counter terrorism in Israel, and to conduct archival research in France and the UK. Levine is the founder of The Washington, D.C. Political Theory Colloquium. He received BA from the University of Chicago and an MA and a PhD from Harvard University.
