Daniel D. Arreola is a professor of geography and an affiliate faculty member with the Center for Latin American Studies at Arizona State University. Arreola has published extensively in scholarly journals and in book chapters on topics relating to the cultural geography of the Mexican–American borderlands. He is the author of the forthcoming *Hispanic Spaces, Latino Places: A Geography of Regional and Cultural Diversity* (University of Texas Press), *Tejano South Texas: A Mexican American Cultural Province* (University of Texas Press, 2002), *Mexican Border Cities: Landscape Anatomy and Place Personality* (University of Arizona Press, 1993). He is also a senior consultant for *World Geography*, a new high school textbook (McDougal Littell, 2003). Arreola serves on editorial boards for several leading geography journals, an international cross-cultural architecture journal, and is a contributing editor to the Hispanic Division of the Library of Congress. He is a past-president of the Association of Pacific Coast Geographers. Born and raised in Los Angeles, California, Arreola has lived and taught in three of the four American states that line the U.S.–Mexico border. He received a PhD in cultural geography from the University of California—Los Angeles.
