

EU and U.S.: Strategies for Spreading Democracy

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Milada Anna Vachudova specializes in the democratization of postcommunist Europe, the enlargement of the European Union, and the impact of international institutions on domestic politics. Before joining the faculty at the University of North Carolina, Vachudova previously held fellowships and research grants from the European University Institute in Italy, the Center for European Studies at Harvard University, the European Union Center of New York City at Columbia University, the Center for International Studies at Princeton University, the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs at Harvard University, and the National Science Foundation. She has

published on democratic consolidation and the reform trajectories of post-communist states; on many facets of the enlargement of the European Union; on the EU's evolving immigration and security policies; on NATO's changing role in European security; and on the ability of international institutions to promote political and economic reform. In her book, *Europe Undivided: Democracy, Leverage and Integration after Communism*, she analyzes how the EU is facilitating democracy and the impact that is having as the EU absorbs more of Europe. Vachudova received her degree after study at Stanford University and the Institut d'Etudes Politiques in Paris. Then as a British Marshall Scholar and a member of St. Antony's College, she completed a DPhil in the faculty of politics at the University of Oxford in 1997.

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
