Securing Japan in a Dangerous Neighborhood

Richard J. Samuels is Ford International Professor of Political Science, a department he chaired for five years (1992–97), and director of the Center for International Studies at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). Samuels served as vice chairman of the Committee on Japan of the National Research Council until 1996 and is founding director of MIT's Japan program. Grants from the Fulbright Commission, the Abe Fellowship Fund, the National Science Foundation, and the Smith Richardson Foundation have supported nine years of field research in Japan. In 2005, he was elected a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and in 2001, he became chairman of the Japan–U.S. Friendship Commission, an independent Federal grant-making agency that supports Japanese studies and policy-oriented research in the United States. His next book, *Securing Japan*, will be published by Cornell University Press (forthcoming, 2007), and his previous books include *Machiavelli's Children: Leaders and Their Legacies in Italy and Japan* (2003), *"Rich Nation, Strong Army": National Security and the Technological Transformation of Japan*, *Business of the Japanese State: Energy Markets in Comparative and Historical Perspective*, and *Politics of Regional Policy in Japan*. His articles have appeared in *International Organization*, *Foreign Affairs*, *International Security*, *Daedalus*, the *Washington Quarterly*, and other scholarly journals. Samuels received a PhD from MIT in 1980.
