Fred E. Woods has taught in the Church Educational System for the past two decades: the past seven years at BYU, and the previous five years at Ricks College (now BYU—Idaho). Woods expertise is Mormon migration. For the past two summers he has been a visiting professor at BYU—Hawaii, where he is doing research for a book he is co-authoring on the history of Laie on the island of Oahu. In 2002, he received the Richard L. Anderson Distinguished Research

Award from BYU Religious Education. During summer 2001, he was a research/teaching fellow at the Mercantile Library and for the Pierre LaCledé Honors College at the University of Missouri—St. Louis, where he spent the summer of 2000 as a research fellow

at the library studying the American West and American transportation history. In 1999, Woods was the Wilkinson research fellow at the Mariner’s Museum in Newport News, VA. He has authored several books and many articles and is the editor and compiler of the *Mormon Immigration Index*, which is currently being used by Family History Centers throughout the world. He is the executive director of the Mormon Historic Sites Foundation. Woods is a native of Southern California and joined the Church just prior to his twentieth birthday. He served a mission to the Adelaide Australia Mission. He received a BS in psychology (1981) and an MS in international relations (1985) from BYU, and in 1991, he received a PhD in Middle East studies from the University of Utah. Woods is married to JoAnna Merrill, and they are the parents of five children and have one grandchild.
