The Distinctiveness of French Anti-Americanism

Sophie Meunier's current research focuses on anti-Americanism in Europe, the complex links between Europeanization and globalization, and the nesting/overlapping of international institutions. Meunier is the author of the *French Challenge: Adapting to Globalization* (with Philip Gordon, Brookings Institution Press, December 2001) and winner of the 2002 France-Americas book award. Her new book, *Trading Voices: The European Union in International Commercial Negotiations*, is forthcoming from Princeton University Press in September 2005. In addition, she has published many articles on the European Union, the politics of international trade, globalization, and French politics in journals such as *International Organization*, *Foreign Affairs*, and *Foreign Policy*. She is currently writing a book manuscript on the politics of French anti-Americanism and she is co-editing the *State of the European Union, Volume 8* (with Kathleen McNamara, forthcoming in 2007). She is an elected member of the Executive Committee of the European Union Studies Association (2003–07); an elected term member of the Council on Foreign Relations (2004–09); the chair of the Council of European Studies' thematic network on globalization; and a member of the Advisory Board of the journal *French Politics*. She runs the seminar "Globalization and Domestic Politics" at the Princeton Institute for International and Regional Studies; is a member of the Economic Negotiation Network; is a reviewer for many political science journals and publishers; and contributes frequently to the French media. She received a BA from the Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Paris (1989) and a PhD in political science from MIT (1998).
