Zachary S. Elkins joined the faculty at Urbana-Champaign in 2002, where his research is focused on democracy, national identity, institutional reform, with an emphasis on Latin America cases, and political methodology. Elkins also co-directs the Comparative Constitutions Project, which is housed at the Center for the Study of Democratic Governance at Urbana-Champaign. He is completing a book entitled *Designed by Diffusion: Constitutional Reform in Developing Democracies*. His published articles include “On Waves, Clusters, and Diffusion: A Conceptual Framework” in *Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science* (2005) and “The Globalization of Liberalization: Policy Diffusion in the International Political Economy” in *American Political Science Review* (2004), both with B. Simmons; “Are Patriots Bigots? An Inquiry into the Vices of In-group Pride” in *American Journal of Political Science* (with R. de Figueiredo, 2003), and “Gradations of Democracy? Empirical Tests of Alternative Conceptualizations” in *American Journal of Political Science* (2000). Elkins received a PhD in political science from the University of California—Berkeley.
