

# The Long Reach: The United States and the Limits to Drug Policy Liberalization in Europe

David Bewley-Taylor's research interests are U.S. foreign policy, urban America, and international drug control policy. At the University of Wales—Swansea, Bewley-Taylor serves on the learning and teaching committee, as the academic director of the study abroad internship program, and as coordinator of department quality. He is an occasional commentator on American politics for BBC Radio Wales and on international drug policy for

other media organizations. Bewley-Taylor has presented papers on various aspects of U.S. diplomacy and transnational drug policy in the U.S., UK, and continental Europe and is a consultant for international drug policy organizations in Europe. His publications have been cited widely in academic and other publications in the U.S., Canada, and Australia, including the *Economist*. In 2002, he published 'The American Crusade: The Internationalization of Drug Prohibition,' *Addiction Research and Theory* and "Habits

of a Hegemon: The United States and the Future of the Global Drug Prohibition Regime," *Polarisation and Paralysis in UN Drug Control: Breaking the Impasse, Transnational Institute Drugs and Conflict Debate Papers*. His book *The United States and International Drug Control* is said to be "an authoritative work" by the Law and Government Division of the Canadian Parliament. He has lectured at the University of Southern Mississippi—Hattiesburg and in 1994 was a visiting lecturer at the University of Wisconsin—La Crosse. Bewley-Taylor received the University of Wales Distinguished Teaching Award in 2004. While an undergraduate, he spent a year at the University of Illinois—Champaign—Urbana, and while studying for his doctorate, he spent considerable time in the U.S., particularly in Washington, D.C. During the course of his postgraduate research, he was awarded a research scholarship by the Harry S. Truman Library. Bewley-Taylor received a BS in economics and a PhD in American studies and geography from the University of Wales—Swansea.
