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Kent Schull has been a visiting professor of history at BYU during the 2006–07 academic year and is an instructor in the humanities department at the University of California—Los Angeles (UCLA) Extension. Previously, he had been a teaching associate and an assistant instructor in the Department of History at UCLA. He has published “Counting the Incarcerated: Young Turk Attempts to Systematically Collect Prison Statistics and their Effects on Prison Reform, 1908–1918” in *Urban Violence and Public Order in the Ottoman Empire (XVIII–XX Centuries)* (forthcoming), “Ottoman State Formation: Eugene Rogan’s *Frontiers of the State in the Late Ottoman Empire: Transjordan, 1850–1921*” in *UCLA Historical Journal* (vol. 20, 2005, pp. 97–105), and “Living and Researching in Istanbul with a Family,” UCLA Center for Near Eastern Studies (September 2004, <http://www.international.ucla.edu/article.asp?parentid=14759>). His language proficiency includes Arabic, Turkish, and Ottoman Turkish at an advanced level, Modern and Biblical Hebrew at an intermediate level, and a reading knowledge of French. Schull received a BA in history *cum laude* from Brigham Young University (1999), an Mst in Jewish studies from the University of Oxford (2000), and both an MA (2003) and a PhD (2007) in history from UCLA.
