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Emerging Diseases in the Tropics: Biology Meets Economics, Politics, and Culture

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Thomas M. Yuill was director and professor at the Gaylord Institute for Environmental Studies (1993–2003) after a distinguished career that has offered him research opportunities in Latin America, Asia, and Africa. Yuill worked with the World Bank in La Paz, Bolivia, and was acting director of the Center for Livestock in International Development. He held a variety of academic positions at the University of Wisconsin—Madison from 1972 to 1993, including associate dean for Research and Graduate Training, professor of pathobiological sciences, and chair of the Department of Veterinary Science, and during which time he researched in Colombia. A civil service assignment focused on the ecology of viruses in tropical Southeast Asia (1966–68). And he was a captain at Walter Reed Army Institute of Research in the Department of Virus Diseases, where he studied arthropod-borne viruses including field studies on vertebrate reservoirs and related laboratory virological and serological work (1964–66). Yuill received a BS in wildlife management with minors in zoology and botany from Utah State University and both an MS and a PhD in wildlife ecology, veterinary science, and virology from the University of Wisconsin.
