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Robert G. Crawford's professional focus on economics and ethics led him to specialize in economic obsolescence, special purpose property value, self and self-interest, and valuation theory. The author of various publications, Crawford's recent works include "Appraising Industrial Special-Purpose Property" and "Unsettling the Metaphysics of NeoClassical Micro-Economic and Management Thinking," (2001, 1998). He earned his bachelor's degree at BYU before pursuing his studies at Carnegie-Mellon University, where he earned his master's

and doctorate degrees, all in economics. In 1972, Crawford began his teaching career as an assistant professor at Brigham Young University. Following a one-year visiting research fellow position at University of California Los Angeles, he returned to BYU. From 1984 to 1990, Crawford served as the chair of BYU's Managerial Economics department. During a portion of this appointment, he also worked as the acting director of the Smith Center for Free Enterprise Studies at BYU. Born in Canada, Crawford holds dual citizenship there and in the U.S.

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
