After completing a bachelor's degree in philosophy, Enoch Lambert began an MPA at the Cornell Institute for Public Affairs (CIPA), where he focused on international development. After the first year, Lambert has taken a leave of absence to live and work in Spring City, Utah, where he is helping to build a straw bale lodge for the Birch Creek Service Ranch. While still an undergraduate at Brigham Young University, his research was focused on philosophy of mind with an emphasis on the role of embodiment and the emerging recognition of its importance in the cognitive sciences. In the summer of 2003, he traveled to India for a field study program researching trends in agriculture among Tibetan refugee settlements, and he returned in January 2006 to conduct further study on the state of India's agriculture. Lambert also served in the Japan Nagova Mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.
