Suzanne Brown-Fleming coordinates programmatic partnerships, symposia, endowed annual lectures, and summer research workshops for the center's University Programs Division at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. Brown-Fleming remains an active scholar in the field of the Holocaust and church relations, with an emphasis on the Roman Catholic Church. Her current research is for a monograph entitled the *Vatican-German Relationship Re-Examined, 1922–1939*, a study of the 2003-released records of the Vatican nunciature in Munich and Berlin during the Weimar Republic and the period of Eugenio Pacelli's tenure as Secretary of State (1930-1939). Other publications include the monographs: *Holocaust and Catholic Conscience: Cardinal Aloisius Muench and the Guilt Question in Germany* (2006) and "The Stigma of Criminality and Jewish-Christian Relations in Postwar Germany," with Michael Berkowitz, in *"We are Here": New Approaches to Jewish Displaced Persons in Postwar Germany* (forthcoming 2007), the book chapters: "Confronting Antisemitism: Rabbi Philip Sidney Bernstein and the Roman Catholic Hierarchy," in *Antisemitism, Christian Ambivalence and the Holocaust* (forthcoming 2007), and "Recent Historiographical Contributions to the History of the Churches and the Holocaust: The Catholic Case," in *Lessons and Legacies VII: The Holocaust in International Perspective* (forthcoming 2006), and the articles: "Granting Absolution: Vatican Nuncio Aloisius Cardinal Muench and the Catholic Clemency Campaign," *Kirchliche Zeitgeschichte: Internationale Halbjahresschrift für Theologie und Geschichtswissenschaft/Contemporary Church History Semi-Annual Journal for History and Theology* (forthcoming), "Faith, Action and Inaction During the Holocaust," *Religion in Eastern Europe: A Quarterly Journal* XXVI:2 (May 2006), and "'The Worst Enemies of a Better Germany': Postwar Antisemitism Among Catholic Clergy and U.S. Occupation Forces," *Holocaust and Genocide Studies* 18:3 (winter 2004). Brown-Fleming received a BA in history and English from Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University (1991), an MA in American diplomatic history from the University of Richmond (1993), and a PhD in modern German history from the University of Maryland (2002). She and her husband, Mark, are the parents of two daughters.
