## Gary Oba

OFFICER-DESIGNEE, XIAMEN/FUJIAN, U.S. CONSULATE GENERAL IN GUANGZHOU

Gary G. Oba previously handled political/military issues in the Office of Japanese Affairs at the Department of State (August 2005–07), served as principal officer of the American Consulate in Nagoya, Japan (July 2002–05), and served concurrently as deputy commissioner general for the U.S. Pavilion at the Aichi World Exposition 2005 (March–July 2005). Prior to Japan, Oba was chief of the Economic and Travel Services Sections of the Kaohsiung Branch Office of the American Institute in Taiwan (July 1996–2000). He entered the Foreign Service in 1987 and has served as the political, economic and consular officer at the American Embassy in Bissau, Guinea-Bissau (West Africa); as a

consular officer at the American Consulate General in Sapporo, Japan; and as an international affairs officer in the Bureau of Human Rights and Democracy at the Department of State in Washington, D.C. Prior to entering the Foreign Service, Oba worked as a city manager/city attorney in St. Mary's Alaska and is a member of the Alaska Bar Association. Born and raised in Colorado, he received a BA in Asian studies and political science, an MPA, and a JD from BYU—Provo. Oba and his wife, Kaoru Yamamoto, an intercultural communications consultant, are the parents of two children: a daughter, Alisa (age 22), and a son, Ken (age 17).
