Bruce W. Bennett is the research leader for strategy, force planning, and counterproliferation within RAND's International Security and Defense Policy Center. Bennett's work applies military simulation and analysis, war gaming, risk management, deterrence-based strategy, and competitive strategies. He specializes in "asymmetric threats" such as weapons of mass destruction (WMD) and how to counter those threats with new strategies, operational

concepts, and technologies, and he is also an expert in northeast Asian military issues, having visited the region some seventy times and written much about Korean security issues. He regularly works with the office of the Secretary of Defense, U.S. Forces Korea, the ROK military, and the ROK National Assembly. Bennett received a PhD in policy analysis from the Pardee RAND Graduate School and a BS in economics from the California Institute of Technology.
