Richard S. Hess

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Richard Hess, professor of Old Testament and Semitic languages, joined the faculty at Denver Seminary in 1997, where he is the editor of the *Denver Journal*, an online theological review journal, and the *Bulletin for Biblical Research*. Hess is also the founder and editor of the *Bulletin's* Supplement Series and is a member of a dozen scholarly societies. His current research projects include commentaries on the books of Genesis and Kings, an introduction to the Old Testament, Hebrew grammar, and the study of ancient Near Eastern texts related to the Old Testament. He has authored eight books, including *Israelite Religions: A Biblical and Archaeological Survey*, *Amarna Personal Names*, *Names in the Study of Biblical History*, and *Studies in the*

Personal Names of Genesis 1–11 and has published more than one hundred scholarly articles in collected essays and journals such as *Biblica*, *Biblical Archaeologist*, *Bulletin for Biblical Research*, *Catholic Biblical Quarterly*, *Themelios*, *Tyndale Bulletin*, *Vetus Testamentum*, and *Zeitschrift fuer die alttestamentliche Wissenschaft*. Hess received a BA from Wheaton College, an MDiv and a ThM from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, and a PhD from Hebrew Union College, as well as having conducted postdoctoral research at universities in Chicago, Jerusalem, Cambridge, Sheffield, and Münster, and has held National Endowment for the Humanities, Fulbright, and Tyndale House (Cambridge) postdoctoral fellowships and grants.
