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# A Genealogy of Japanese Colonial Policies: The Views of Christian University Scholars

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Jin Makabe, a visiting research fellow at the Harvard-Yenching Institute, is an associate professor in the Graduate School of Law and Politics at Hokkaido University. Makabe specializes in Japanese intellectual history from the seventeenth to the twentieth century. At Harvard, he is studying Chinese dynastic legitimacy in seventeenth- and eighteenth-century Japan, examining the political backdrop and intellectual transformations that took place during the late Ming and early Qing periods. His recent work explores Japanese social democracy in the early twentieth century, with a focus on the colonial policies of Christian scholars at Imperial universities. Makabe's first book, *Tokugawa-kōki no gakumon to seiji: Shōbeizaka-gakumonjo-jushya to Bakumatsu gaikō benyō* (*Politics and Academia in Late Tokugawa Japan: Shōbeizaka Confucians and Diplomatic Transformation*; 2007), won the Tokugawa Prize for 2008, awarded by the Tokugawa Memorial Foundation for the best academic book on early-modern Japanese history, and is the winner of the Kadokawa Genyoshi Award for the best work on Japanese history in 2007. Makabe received a BA in political science from International Christian University and an MA and a PhD in the history of political thought from Tokyo Metropolitan University.
