SENIOR ANALYST, CIA

Mark Henshaw is a senior analyst in CIA's Information Operations Center, where he has spent ten years studying cyber threats to U.S. national security, particularly the use of information technology by terrorists, organized crime, and hackers. Henshaw co-founded IOC's Silent Horizon war-gaming series, which runs biannual war games that focus on complex national cybersecurity topics, and the findings are briefed to the White House, the National Security Council, the Departments of State, Treasury, Defense, and Energy; and to numerous other organizations. In 2007, he received the Director of National Intelligence's Galileo Award

for Innovation in Intelligence for his paper "A National Security Simulations Center," co-written with Rachel Hanig (available online). A graduate of the Sherman Kent School's Advanced Analyst Program and an emeritus member of the CIA Red Cell, he is the recipient of fifteen CIA exceptional performance awards. Henshaw received a BS in political science, an MA in international relations, and an MBA from Brigham Young University. His master's thesis focused on the application of theoretical frameworks of war to cybersecurity and was nominated for the Western Association of Graduate Schools Distinguished Thesis Award.
