Rachel L. Swarns covers immigration issues in Washington and across the country for The New York Times. Since joining The Times' Washington bureau in March 2003, she has written about the heated battle in Congress over immigration legislation, Bush administration policy toward Muslim immigrants after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001 and about how Mexican immigration is transforming small towns in the South. Between September 1999 and February 2003, she served as the The Times' Johannesburg bureau chief, covering 11 countries in Southern Africa. She first joined The New York Times in December 1995 where she served as a general assignment reporter for the metro desk, covered social services, including welfare reform and foster care in New York City, the aftermath of the TWA Flight 800 crash and stints on the 1996 presidential campaign. She covered homelessness and health care in Russia in 1996 and the Pope's visit to Cuba in 1997.

Before joining The Times, Ms. Swarns was a reporter at The Miami Herald from 1991 until 1995 covering immigration, housing, federal courts and general assignment. Before that she was with The St. Petersburg Times from 1989 until 1991 covering criminal courts.

Born in Queens, N.Y., on July 10, 1967, Ms. Swarns received a B.A. degree in Spanish, graduating summa cum laude phi beta kappa, from Howard University in Washington, D.C., in 1989 and an M.A. degree, graduating with distinction in International Relations, from the University of Kent, Canterbury, England, in 1994.

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
