

BRITISH LITERATURE AND LANDSCAPE

STUDY ABROAD SPRING 2019



Hike across the Brontës' moors. Climb peaks and walk the lakeshore where Wordsworth and Coleridge composed their verses. Roam the landscape that fed Shakespeare's imagination. Meditate at the table by the window where Austen wrote her novels. Take a meal in the pub where Tolkien and Lewis' Inklings conversed. Stroll the streets memorialized by Joyce.

In the British Literature and Landscape Study Abroad Program, students will hike the landscapes of British and Irish literature as they study the writing of great literary minds, from the urban intellectual centers of London, Dublin, and Edinburgh, to the wilds of the Scottish highlands and the Lake District. The group will visit Shakespeare's Warwickshire, the poets' Wales, the coastline that inspired Keats and Tennyson, King Arthur's Tintagel, and much more.

HOUSING

The group will be staying in youth hostels and B&Bs as they hike throughout Scotland, England, Wales and Ireland.

COURSES

Students will register for 6 credit hours during spring term from the following courses:

English 300R English Literature in a Cultural Setting (3 credit; counts for GE Letters requirement and English major credit)

English 317 Travel Writing (3 credits; counts for English major credit)

Participants may not take any other courses on this program, including BYU Online courses, without approval by the program director and ISP.

COST

\$6,600–6,900

Includes LDS, undergraduate full tuition (increased cost for graduate and non-LDS students), housing, 80% of meals, and international health insurance coverage.

Not Included: airfare, some meals, and personal expenses.

PREPARATION

Accepted students are required to participate in an international, cross-cultural preparation course (IAS 201, 1 credit hour). This evening course will be held during the second block of winter semester 2019. Part-time and non-BYU students will need to pay an additional tuition fee for enrolling in this prep class.

FUNDING SOURCES

The College of Humanities offers scholarships that can be used for this program. For application information write to the program directors.

Accepted students may be eligible for the Blessing/Kagel Literature and Landscape Study Abroad Award from the English Department.

Regular BYU tuition scholarships, Pell Grants, and Federal Insured Student Loans may be applied to study abroad programs.

Students who submit the financial aid section of the ISP application and who have a current FAFSA form on file at the Financial Aid Office (A-41 ASB) will be considered for a study abroad scholarship and may be considered for other scholarships. They *must indicate on their original online application* that they want to be considered for financial aid.

Private grants and scholarships outside of BYU may also assist (see kennedy.byu.edu/scholarships).

APPLICATION PROCESS

Complete the online application at kennedy.byu.edu/apply. The application requires a \$35 fee.

Applicants will be interviewed once the application is complete.

Students will be notified via e-mail of their acceptance into the program.
